Purpose: To support community driven projects that build Australia's resilience to violent extremism and lessen the impact and appeal of violent extremist messages in our communities

Overview: The Building Community Resilience Grants Program aims to support community projects across Australia that build resilience to violent extremism.

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The program offers two categories of grants funding - from \$5,000 to \$20,000 and from \$20,001 to \$100,000

(excluding GST).

Grants will be awarded to a range of local initiatives that:

- give communities the skills and resources to understand and actively address intolerant or extremist messages and discourage violent extremism
- support people who may be vulnerable to extremist views due to personal experiences of disengagement and marginalisation, and
- educate groups and individuals about the avenues available to participate positively in political debate.

Limitations: applicants must not seek funding for the following:

- academic research
- political party campaign activities
- activities that are currently in progress (ie are already being funded and are not complete)
- projects that duplicate currently funded activities
- projects involving the purchase of major capital equipment (valued at more than 5 per cent of the total amount of funding sought) or the conduct of capital works
- projects involving high staffing costs where there is no in-kind contribution from the Applicant or another source, or
- general operational or administrative costs of the applicant organisation or another organisation (although funding may be provided for administrative expenses that are directly and exclusively associated with the proposed project).

Who can apply: Below is a list of mandatory items that must be satisfied or completed in order to be eligible for BCR grant funding:

- the applicants must complete the Application Form released with these Guidelines (copies of the form can be downloaded from the Attorney-General's Department website at www.ag.gov.au/cve)
- an applicant must be, at the time of its application, an association incorporated in the State or Territory in which it will carry out the proposed project¹, and is:
 - a not-for-profit organisation, or
 - a local government organisation (see Part 2.1 of the Application Form)
- an applicant must not be:
 - an individual
 - a political organisation
 - any Australian Government or State or Territory government agency, or
 - commercial and for-profit organisation.
- the proposed project must be between \$5,000 and \$20,000 and between \$20,001 and \$100,000 (GST exclusive) (see Part 2.2 of the Application Form)

Overview: Permanent Telstra Group employees can apply for a Telstra's Kids Fund grant of \$1,200 to support a project or activity run by a not-for-profit organisation involving a child, 18 years or under, in their immediate family.

Each year \$750,000 is given to local community organisations on behalf of children related to Telstra employees.

There are three funding rounds per year.

Telstra's Kids Fund provides grants for not-for-profit organisations in the following areas:

Requests for musical equipment, educational resources, sport and recreation equipment and building upgrades have been among the grants given by Telstra's Kids Fund.

Limitations: Telstra's Kids Fund does not support:

- Individual children
- Projects which are completed prior to the Grants Committee decision
- Promotional activities
- Programs with a religious, political or sectarian purpose
- General operational/administration functions
- Conferences
- Retrospective costs
- Projects outside of Australia
- General fundraising appeals.

Telstra's Kids Fund is unable to donate Telstra products and services.

Who can apply: To be considered for funding you must meet these eligibility criteria:

1. You must be a Telstra Group employee - A Telstra Group employee includes any permanent full or part time

employee of a company that, on the date the grant application round closes, is an Australian wholly owned

and controlled subsidiary of the Telstra Corporation Ltd. Contractors and casual employees to Telstra are not

eligible to apply for a Telstra's Kids Fund grant.

2. The organisation must be not-for-profit - An organisation is not-for-profit when their constituent or governing

documents prevent them from distributing profits or assets for the benefit of particular persons, both while

they are operating and on winding up. A not-for-profit organisation can still make a profit, however any

profits it makes must be used to carry out its purposes and not distributed to owners, members or other

private persons. Organisations do NOT require DGR or TCC endorsement to be eligible.

3. The child must be 18 years of age or under and part of your immediate family - Telstra Group employees can

apply for a grant on behalf of a child, 18 years or under, who is part of their immediate family:

- o Child

- o Sibling
- o Step-child
- o Niece/nephew
- o Grandchild
- o Foster child.
- o Child of a de facto partner

4. The child must be involved in the organisation, on the date the Telstra's Kids Fund grant application round closes.

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5. A Telstra Group employee may only make a successful application to the Telstra's Kids Fund once every three years as determined from the original grant application closing date. This allows others a chance to get involved.

Telstra's Kids Fund may fund the same 'local' not-for-profit organisation more than once in a funding round, provided each application is made by a different Telstra Group employee and relates to a separate project or activity.

If you know a member of your community group is a Telstra employee - why not check with them about applying on behalf of your group

Australian Taxation Office (ATO) as a Tax Concession Charity (TCC). A current copy of the letter of endorsement must be provided before your application will be considered. Please note that an ITEC (Income

Tax Exempt Charity) endorsement is NOT sufficient and will not be accepted.

- Deductible Gift Recipient - Organisations which are also endorsed by the ATO as a Deductible Gift Recipient

(DGR) must send a copy of the endorsement with the application. Some of the charitable trusts administered

by Trust Company can only make grants to organisations that are endorsed as both a TCC and a DGR. If your

organisation has both endorsements please provide proof.

- Australian Business Register - Many organisations use the Australian Business Register (ABR) to check its TCC

and DGR endorsements. Although the Register is a useful tool, a print out from the Register will not be

Purpose: To seek Expressions of Interest from organisations keen to partner with the nib foundation to run large

scale, nationally-focused programs that focus on carers and young people.

Overview: Through the National Grant program nib foundation will aim to partner with up to three organisations

simultaneously for generally not less than three years. The focal areas:

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- **Carers** - Carers represent about 2.6 million of Australia's population, cross all age groups, cultural backgrounds and geographical locations and are often invisible contributors to the health of the Australian community. Carers in Australia contributed an estimated 1.2billion hours of care in 2005 and yet they have the lowest level of wellbeing of any group in our society (Source: Deakin University, Australian Unity and Carers Australia, 2007).

AND

- **Young People**, under 25 years - Young people's health and wellbeing are influenced by a multitude of factors such as: behaviour, environment, family, community, genetic and socio-economic factors. There are more than 3.7million young people in Australia, representing 18% of the population (Young Australians: Their health and wellbeing, Australian Institute of Health and Welfare, 2007), many of whom are facing significant health challenges.

Priorities: Preference will be given to programs that best address the priority areas and meet the following criteria:

- How it fits with the foundation's Vision. Mission and Charter - addressing the core areas as specified on the website.
- The program must target the health and wellbeing of the chosen cohort and demonstrate a measurable impact on lives and health outcomes.
- Demonstrate the evidence or policy basis for the program's development.
- The program must be innovative. The foundation will look to support programs that address a problem in a new way or address an issue that is not currently being satisfactorily addressed.
- The program must demonstrate sustainability beyond the life of the funding period. That is, a sustainability plan must be developed during the course of the partnership with clear pathways articulated.
- Your organisation must show capacity (skills of staff) and the capability to manage the program, including financial management.
- The program must display sound methodology and demonstrate the capacity to deliver long-term benefits to

the participants.

- The organisation must demonstrate the ability to report and articulate a social return to the community.
- The organisation must have the ability and capacity to scale and replicate programs.
- Ability to reach across established boundaries, sectors and fields of business, government and non-profit activity to form partnerships for skills and knowledge transfer.

Limitations: National Grant recipients will need to ensure that a program evaluation is built into the grant application

process and provide annual progress reports and a final report of the program outcomes.

Organisations receiving

larger grants are encouraged to undertake an external evaluation and should factor this into their program budget.

The foundation requires three (3) referees to support National Grant applications including two (2) referees external

to the organisation. The foundation may visit the site of any organisation to which it intends to provide a National

Grant at times and conditions to be agreed between parties.

What activities fall outside National Grant criteria?:

- Areas considered to be the direct responsibility of government
- Travel, study or conferences (unless incidental to a program being funded)
- General maintenance or overhead expenses (unless part of a specific program)
- Programs with a religious, political or sectarian purpose
- Individuals
- Other foundations, trusts or philanthropic organisations to fund their general objectives
- For-profit programs or activities (social enterprise may be considered)
- Requests for sponsorship
- Programs outside of Australia
- Endowments, memorials or named academic chairs
- Retrospective costs
- General fundraising appeals
- Major building works as the sole purpose of the application
- Government entities

Who can apply: Organisations that work in the identified focal areas and have Deductible Gift Recipient (DGR) and

Tax Concession Charity (TCC) status are eligible to apply.

may name no more than five members.

Purpose: To provide one-off support for a local community program that will make a difference to the lives of

marginalised Australian youth.

Overview: Funding provided by the CCAF will target 2 core areas:

- Education - providing and enhancing basic skills to assist young people in improving their day-to-day lives.

- Leadership - enabling young people to develop confidence and leadership skills for their future.

Within the core areas of education and leadership, projects will then be selected for funding based on applicants

successfully finding innovative ways to address 2 key societal issues:

- Wellbeing - promoting the physical fitness, nutrition education and social wellbeing of young people.

• The Environment - promoting the sustainability of the environment for future generations of young people.
Applications will be accepted at anytime. Applications received after the round's closing date will be held on file for consideration during the next round.

Priorities: Priority will be given to projects that focus on engaging young people aged 12-25. This does not mean the total exclusion of other age groups, but programs must clearly prioritise 12-25 year olds.

Limitations: The scope of activities supporting marginalised Australian youth is very wide but activities which fall outside the grant criteria are:

- Grants to individuals, including students.
- Activities which collect funds for subsequent redistribution to other charities or individuals.
- Fundraising events or activities.
- Purchase of land or buildings.
- Refurbishment to fabric of buildings.
- Overseas appeals.
- Sponsorship of marketing appeals.
- Expeditions or overseas travel.
- Endowment Funds.
- Conferences or seminars.
- Salaries.

Who can apply:

• Your organisation must have Deductible Gift Recipient (DGR) status from the Australian Taxation Office.

• The program must target marginalised youth. Within this broad area, your application will be assessed on how it fits with the Foundation's charter - addressing the core areas of education, leadership, wellbeing and environment (refer to Coca-Cola Australia Foundation Charter).

• The program must be able to demonstrate a difference or improvement for the specific youth issue it addresses.

• The program must be innovative. The Foundation looks to support programs that address a problem in a new way or address an issue that is not currently being satisfactorily addressed.

Purpose: To recognise ideas and achievement of young deaf people from all over Australia and highlight the positive contribution that young deaf people make to society.

Overview: The program was established in 2000 after combining two existing trusts; the Nelson & Brook Educational

Trusts with the Cecilia & Allen Tye Trust. In addition, Deaf Children Australia matches this Victorian funding dollar for

dollar to make the Youth Grants available Australia-wide.

Young deaf people, aged 15 - 21 years old, can now apply to receive a grant of up to \$2,000 to help them achieve a personal goal or project.

Your project could be based on -

- Personal Development - A dream, ambition or personal goal that may boost self-esteem and contribute to personal development, for example, an art exhibition of your own work, writing a play or participating in sporting events (conditional)
- Deaf Community & Culture - Exploring an aspect of Deaf Community and Culture; such as exploring other people's life experiences and values, visit a deaf school in another state, volunteering to work at a deaf school, attend an exchange program overseas, study the history of the deaf community or visit deaf children in isolated/rural areas
- Leadership Challenges - Funding for young deaf people to develop their leadership skills and provide a positive image of young deaf person to the wider community. Recipients could teach deaf awareness or Auslan in a community group or mainstream school, teach Auslan to parents of deaf children, establish a debate group for young deaf people or set up a youth club for young deaf people.
- Education - Deaf Children Australia strongly support young deaf people studying in any field at Secondary or Tertiary levels, and those who may need support with their specific schooling. This could be studying at University or TAFE, attending a special conference or event that is related to your course or interest or a small course such as aromatherapy, massage therapy or business studies.
- Life Experience/Education - For example; participating in a team sport and representing your State or Australia against other teams and competitors

Priorities: Priority will be given to new applicants.

Limitations: The following types of projects will not receive grants from the Deaf Children Australia Youth Grants:

- Applications by an organised group such as schools, voluntary groups or youth clubs.
- Fundraising activities e.g. cycle ride for Deaf Children Australia or any other charity.
- Applications for financial assistance with support services (eg. interpreters/note takers) for students studying in Tertiary or Secondary education.
- Driver's Education.
- Leisure camps such as end of year school celebrations or end of year camps.
- School trips will not be funded unless the camp has a direct community benefit, eg. Leadership camps, Duke of Edinburgh medals.
- Equipment such as digital and video cameras will not be supported unless the applicant requires the equipment for their TAFE/University course.
- Computers (including laptops), hardware and software will not be provided unless the applicant has an additional disability and can demonstrate its need for their educational use.

Who can apply: Applicants must be deaf or hard of hearing.

- You are deaf or hard of hearing.
- You are 15 - 21 years of age now, and will not be 22 years old by the end of your project
- We provide Youth Grants every year. You have to start your project this year (2010) and you have 12 months to finish. For example, from July 2010 - June 2011. Please contact us if you cannot start this year
- We provide Youth Grants every year. You have to start your project this year (2010) and you have 12 months to finish. For example, from July 2010 - June 2011. Please contact us if you cannot start this year
- The maximum amount you get is \$2,000.

- You must be an Australian resident.
- You must keep receipts and invoices of your expenses. At the end of your project, you send them to Deaf Children Australia with the claim form and we then pay you for that amount. You must do this by 31st January 2011. After this date, we cannot give you the money.

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- New applicants will be looked at first.
- When you finish the project, you have to submit a report.
- If you have applied before, we will not take applications for similar projects. But you can still apply every year for different projects
- You will provide a report at completion of your project
- Someone from Deaf Children Australia will later email you to ask about your project. This information will be written into a good news story which will be used in Deaf Children Australia newsletters, on the website and articles in a local newspaper.

Purpose: To celebrate the gifts and strengths of young people from the Australian community who exhibit determination and potential but who lack the personal support networks and resources that will allow them to fulfill that potential by providing scholarships to pursue further education, training or development.

Overview: Nominees must be between the ages of 14 and 21 years, and can apply for one scholarship per year.

Nominations for the Youth Off The Streets Scholarship Program are not restricted to a specific study or training path.

Nominations are invited from young people with genuine talent, ability and determination in any field, including (but

not limited to): education and training; visual or performing arts; sport; trade skills; and music.

The wide-ranging goals pursued by the scholarship recipients will encourage other disadvantaged young people to

follow their dreams.

Youth Off the Streets will match each scholarship recipient with a mentor. This relationship will provide ongoing

become engaged and take responsibility for young people in Australia. Those recipients in the Sydney area will be matched with a face to face mentor through the Youth off The Streets Mentoring Program. Those young people who are from other locations throughout Australia will be matched with an 'e-mentor'. This innovative program matches young people with a mentor who they are in contact with online through a secure and monitored chat room. For those young people living in rural or remote locations, or those who lack traditional support networks, this mentoring involvement offers them additional support and encouragement for their scholarship period.

Who can apply: Criteria for nomination:

- Nominations for the 2011 Scholarship Program are being taken from all states Australia
- Nominees must be between the ages of 14 and 21 on May 6th, 2011
- Nominees must be citizens or permanent residents of Australia
- Nominations may be made on behalf of a young person, or by a young person themselves
- A young person may only be nominated for one scholarship per year
- The young person nominated must have a clear need for financial assistance
- Scholarship recipients will be required to identify a Pathway Plan, which clearly shows how the scholarship money would be used
- All nominations must include at least one reliable, independent referee letter, confirming the personal circumstances and talent or skill of the young person nominated.
